As YPK Bali has been developing and growing as a foundation over the past few months, we think it is time to officially inform all of our patients, friends, family and whoever else might be interested, exactly what we have achieved over this time and who we have to thank for our developments until now. While there is still a long road ahead of us, we strongly believe that with all our enthusiastic, determined staff and continuing support from sponsors, donors and volunteers, the coming years will see a strengthening and expansion of YPK's programs and services.

Every 4 months we will release a new edition so that you can follow us along our path to providing rehabilitation services, support and hope to as many physically disabled people as possible throughout all 8 regencies in Bali.

### Education for YPK Children

In March 2009, YPK introduced a seed education program for YPK child patients aged between 1 ½ to 13 years old. Following their regular therapy session on Saturdays, children who have not been accepted into the public school system participate in educational classes which focus on reading, writing, mathematics, artwork and English. The informal education sessions are designed to stimulate the minds and improve social skills of our child patients. Up until now, 9 children have participated in the program which is taught and facilitated by volunteer students from the Bali International School, Tiffanie, Jessica and Akta, along with YPK patient, Eka. In 2010 we plan to expand this program to 30 children from poor backgrounds in the areas of Denpasar and The expanded program will be Badung. supervised by a professionally trained teacher and teaching assistant and will be available to 3 groups of children, 2 times per week each.

#### Australian Volunteers at YPK

**Sophie** is working as Business Development Officer through the "AYAD" program, to raise funds for YPK and hopefully attract new sponsors and donors to support our future programs. She is also providing weekly English lessons for YPK staff.

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Lizzie is a Physiotherapist, volunteering through the "VIDA" program to strengthen YPK services by training our local Physiotherapists and developing the evening physiotherapy clinic. The 'new' evening clinic was set up in July 2009 for working professionals who can afford to pay for physiotherapy treatment. All fees for the evening clinic treatment go directly towards the costs associated with providing a free service to YPK patients who cannot afford to pay for therapy. Lizzie is currently supervising the clinic, but has already begun in-services (skill training sessions) for out local physiotherapists so the professional service can continue when Lizzie returns home to Australia. So far, the clinic has proven to be very amongst both expatriates popular Indonesians alike. We hope the success of the clinic continues to grow in future!

## Skill Training for Physically Disabled People

From 21-26 July, the Bali Labour Department along with YPK, lead a skills training workshop designed encourage physically disabled people to enter the workforce. The 20 workshop participants came from all 8 regencies in Bali with varying physical conditions such as

visual impairment, post Stroke, Polio and Cerebral Palsy. The workshop explored possible professions the participants could undertake and also looked at business management practices. The Bali Labour Department will provide each participant with the tools and equipment needed to start their own businesses. All participants were very enthusiastic about their new job prospects. YPK will be sure to report updates on the progress of workshop participants in Edition 2 of the YPK Newsletter.

### YPK Bali Fundraising Event

YPK is in the beginning stages of planning a fundraising event for 6 February 2010, to raise awareness and understanding about YPK and the state of disabilities in Bali. The event will be held at Villa Dampati, Sanur, and will include finger food, live music, raffle draw and auction.
